
THE WORD

At the time of writing this Gospel, there is widespread persecution of the Christian community in Rome. The followers of Jesus are no doubt feeling threatened and uncertain as to how things will turn out for them.

In order to give his audience hope for the future, the Gospel writer seeks to present Jesus' vision. While on first reading today, the presentation feels somewhat bleak and daunting, this is not language we're used to reading at Mass on a Sunday. Jesus tells us there will be times of great turmoil, there will be wars and earthquakes, there will be famines. You will witness people betrayed by their peers and handed over to the authorities. The sun will be darkened, and the moon will lose its brightness. Many of Jesus' followers will identify with these words. The world around them seems to be falling apart. They will be challenged at every turn. But there must be light at the end of the tunnel. Jesus indeed sees beyond all this suffering to a place of peace with God. Jesus imagines peace beyond suffering. This vision is vital for the community who read Mark's Gospel. This vision of peace and love is vital for all of us gathered around the Gospel this weekend.

(Mark's Gospel)


LEARN

REFLECT

ext weekend, we will celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. The readings will change in tone and focus over the weeks ahead and we've been brought on a wonderful journey through Mark's Gospel over the past number of months. With everything we have been through with Jesus, his healing actions, his tenderness and compassion to the stranger - isn't it interesting that we end this period of time with Mark's Gospel talking about the end of time! What a way for us to enter the season of Advent in a couple of weeks! No doubt, there are certain movies that spring

to mind, where an asteroid is speeding towards earth, and only Bruce Willis or Will Smith has the power to save the planet. Talk of the end of time leaves us feeling a little anxious.

If we focus too much on the heaviness of the language in apocalyptic literature, we have missed the point. Jesus is a powerful preacher who teaches using contrasting images and forces. This is one of those occasions where we sit up and listen. Yes, there are times in our lives when the world around us seems to be caving in. There are times when the struggle to continue

with life bears heavy on the weary soul. But within the struggle and the fight, the love, mercy, and compassion of Jesus is found.

As for our spiritual growth, Mark's Gospel is not about waiting for the end. It's about how we live here and now. It's a call to live with purpose and to cherish each moment. To be active participants in God's redemptive love living lives that are rich in love, abundant in service, and overflowing with the joy that comes from knowing him.

Christ, on the other hand, has offered one single sacrifice for sins, and then taken his place for ever, at the right hand of God, where he is now waiting until his enemies are made into a footstool for him. By virtue of that one single offering, he has achieved the eternal perfection of all whom he is sanctifying. When all sins have been forgiven, there can be no more sin offerings.

GOSPEL

Mark 13:24-32

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark.

Jesus said to his disciples: "In those days, after the time of distress, the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then too he will send the angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven.

"Take the fig tree as a parable: as soon as its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. So with you, when you see these things happening: know that he is near, at the very gates. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all these things will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

"But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father."
